RALLY RECIPE: Dutch Oven Chicken, Broccoli & Rice

Ingredients:

Cooking oil (canola or vegetable)
6-8 boneless, skinned chicken breasts

cut in bite size pieces

1 onion, chopped

Salt and pepper

1 can cream of mushroom soup

1 can cream of chicken soup

1 can cream of celery soup

1 can of chicken broth

3 cups instant white rice

½ cup shredded Parmesan cheese

10-oz. bag of frozen chopped broccoli

Directions:

- 1. Prepare a fire for Dutch oven cooking. Generously oil a cast iron Dutch oven.
- 2. Brown the chicken breast pieces and onion in the Dutch oven. Season with salt and pepper to taste.
- 3. Add the soups, broth, rice and broccoli to the chicken and onion mixture. Mix well. Sprinkle cheese on top of mixture.
- 4. Cover the Dutch oven and cook for 45-55 minutes at 375 degrees (19 briquettes on top and 9 briquettes on the bottom). To cook in a home oven, pour mixture into a baking dish and cover with foil and bake at 375 degrees for 45 minutes. Remove foil and cook 10 more minutes until cheese is brown.

Serves 10 people.



DESTINATION POINT: Chaco Canyon National Historical Park

Chaco Canyon. Remote. Fascinating. Unbelievable. Unbelievable that a culture could exist, no, flourish in such a dry climate. Fascinating that dwellings built with stone tools rise three stories high. Fascinating that this was all accomplished before the Europeans even thought about coming to the Americas.





Located near Farmington, in the northwest corner of New Mexico, Chaco Canyon is a must see destination. The Ancestral Pueblo culture began to flourish there in the mid-800s and persisted over 300 years. By 1050 Chaco was the ceremonial, administrative and economic center of the area. Massive Great Houses with hundreds of rooms is proof of the importance of their cultural influence, planned communities sometimes took years to complete through building techniques unheard of during their time. Always innovating and improving, structures remaining today display six different styles of masonry.



Chaco was connected to outlying communities and

resource areas through a planned system of over 400 miles of roadway. Some still visible today. During the 1100's and 1200's, change began in Chaco.





DESTINATION POINT: Chaco Canyon National Historical Park continued ...

Some scientists think extreme weather changes created a drought so severe agriculture could no longer sustain the populace. The Ancestral Pueblos started to move toward Mesa Verde and Aztec.

When visiting this area, it is highly recommended NOT to drive a personal vehicle into the area. There are tours available through the Salmon Ruins Museum near Farmington, which provides transportation to the location, plenty of water, lunch and a guide. Well worth the money. And while at the museum, visit the Pueblo ruins on site, the Pioneer Homestead and view the artifacts on display in the museum. (www.salmonruins.com)

A few other facts before visiting Chaco Culture National Historical Park. The nearest town is 60 miles away; there is no lodging, gasoline, repair services or food available at the park. There is a campground a mile from the Visitor Center, which has tables, fireplaces and central toilets, but cannot accommodate trailers over 30 feet long. Water is available only at the Visitor Center.





While in the area, another Ancestral Community to visit is Aztec Ruins National Monument. Walk through the ruins and the Great Kiva. Their museum displays pottery reflecting the changes in culture over several periods. If it's a full moon, ask about their nighttime walks. Most fascinating! (www.nps.gov)
