RALLY RECIPE: Upper Michigan Pasties

Pasties have a long tradition in mining communities in Europe and the United States due to their convenient easy-to-handle shape and substantial filling which satisfies hearty appetites. The Upper Peninsula of Michigan has embraced this tradition, and made it a Yooper specialty. Lehto's Pasties just east of St. Ignace is famous for their beef, chicken and vegetable pasties which can be ordered online at <u>www.lehtospasties.com</u>. They are not sharing their recipes but the one below has all the ingredients of a classic beef pasty.

Ingredients for Pasty:

½ pound shortening or lard (or combination)1 cup boiling water4 cups of all-purpose flour2 teaspoons of salt

Ingredients for Filling:

8 potatoes, peeled and cubed
1 large rutabaga, peeled and cubed
1 pound ground sirloin
3 sweet onion, peeled and chopped
2 teaspoons of salt
½ teaspoons of black pepper
Butter





RALLY RECIPE: Upper Michigan Pasties continued...

Directions:

- 1. Pour boiling water over shortening and/or lard and stir until shortening is dissolved.
- 2. Add salt to flour and stir into dissolved shortening. Mix together until it forms a ball.
- 3. Wrap dough in plastic wrap and refrigerate overnight.
- 4. Preheat oven to 425 degrees.
- 5. Combine all filling ingredients in a large bowl.
- 6. Divide the dough into 8 equal portions.
- 7. Roll each dough ball on a floured surface into a circle about 1/8 inch thick. Brush edges of rounds with water.
- 8. Spoon 1/8 of the filling onto lower half of each round, then fold upper half over. Press edges together and crimp with a fork or fold edges over to make a tight seal.
- 9. Place pasties on a baking sheet and bake for 15 minutes, then reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake for 45-60 minutes until nicely browned. Brush tops with melted butter if desired.

Pasties can be served hot, warm or cold.

Serves 8 people.

Join us for the September Rally at Fort Pickens State Park. This is a no host rally with no rally fee. There is more to see and do than you can accomplish in one weekend. There is a wide variety of local attractions including, hiking, boating, beaches, museums, historic villages and the world-famous Blue Angels. Visit <u>www.visitpensacola.com</u> for a complete listing of special events and local attractions. A few highlights are described below.

National Naval Aviation Museum, 17500 Radford Boulevard, Pensacola Naval Air Station, Pensacola, FL, (850) 452-3604. The museum is the world's largest Naval Aviation Museum with over 150 restored aircraft and over 4,000 artifacts in 350,000 square feet of exhibition space. The museum is open daily from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and admission is free. Please note that visitors without a

Department of Defense identification card must enter/exit at the West Gate (Blue Angels Parkway) and present valid forms of identification.

Pensacola Art Museum, 407 South Jefferson Street, Pensacola, FL 32302, (850) 432-6247. Special exhibits during September include Prints of Francisco Goya and Federico Castelo and American Impressionist Women. The museum is open Tuesday – Friday 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; Saturday 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.; and Sunday 12:00 noon to 4:00 p.m. The admission fee is \$7.00 for adults.

Blue Angels Practices, Museum Flight Line north of the National Naval Aviation Museum,

Pensacola, FL. The world-famous Blue Angels are the United States Navy's flight demonstration squadron, with aviators from the Navy and Marines. The Blue Angels team was formed in 1946, making it the second oldest formal flying aerobatic team in the world, after the French Patrouille de France formed in 1931. Practice sessions for September are scheduled for the 13th and the 19th beginning at 11:30 a.m. and lasting about 55 minutes. Open bleacher seating is available for 1,000 people and admission is free. Sun and hearing protection are recommended. ID check is required for all visitors to access the museum flight line to view the Blue Angels practice. Practice sessions are subject to weather and maintenance cancellations.

Historic Pensacola Village, 120 Church Street, Pensacola, FL 32502, (850) 595-5985. Collection of 28 historic buildings and museums with living history demonstrations by costumed docents. Self-guided tours of the property and four museums. Guided tours at 11:00 a.m., 1:00 p.m. and 2:30 p.m. Open Tuesday – Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Admission is \$7.00 for seniors.

Jacksonian Guard Colors Ceremony, Plaza Ferdinand (Downtown on North Palafox and East Cervantes Street at the flagpole), (850) 466-5220. The Jacksonian Guard is a Pensacola re-enactment group of Jacksonian era and Spanish soldiers, fifer and drummers who perform a colors ceremony every third Saturday (September 16th) at noon to celebrate Pensacola's 195th birthday and Florida becoming a US territory. The ceremony is open to the public and free.

Palafox Market (Downtown at Martin Luther King Plaza on North Palafox between West Gregory Street and West Chase Streets), (850) 434-5371. Free open-air Saturday market operating from 9:00 a.m. – 200 p.m. featuring fresh produce, baked good, fine art, and antiques.

Thursday, September 14, 2017

6:00 p.m. Early bird arrivers can dine, at their option, at a local restaurant.

Friday, September 15, 2017

- 5:00 p.m. Social Hour in the campground. Please bring a light snack to share and your beverage of choice.
